A Miracle in our Midst

In 1989, Dr. Edward Gatz was diagnosed with invasive cancer of the esophagus and expected to live no more than six months. Today, Dr. Gatz is cancer free and he and his wife, Jeanne, passionately share the story that begins with a devastating diagnosis and ends in something that can only be described as miraculous. We were honored to have Dr. and Mrs. Jeanne Gatz recently visit San Francisco and share the details of their journey to the miracle that led to the canonization of St. Jeanne Jugan, the Foundress of the Little Sisters of the Poor.

Twenty-four years ago Dr. Gatz expected to die. He was depressed and not even interested in thinking about the next day. He declined to undergo conventional treatments as he was told that they would not cure him and likely not prolong his life. The first thing Mrs. Gatz wanted to do was to pray and to get everyone to pray with her. Seeking solace, she contacted her old friend, Fr. Richard McGloin, S.J., who had been not only her professor, but was also a former chaplain for the Little Sisters of the Poor. He immediately encouraged her to pray to Jeanne Jugan. Along with Mrs. Gatz, Fr. McGloin prayed to Jeanne Jugan every day. Dr. Gatz was given the sacrament of the anointing of the sick three times and he explains, "A most unexpected and powerful event took place for me after receiving the anointing. There was a sense of peace and joy, almost euphoria, and each time was more powerful than the one before." From that point, Dr. Gatz was ready to take it all on. Surgery was performed to remove the fist-sized tumor from his esophagus because if not removed, it would block his ability to swallow. The surgery, which removed most of his esophagus and stomach, had a very low success


rate, but time passed and Dr. Gatz was still alive.

In 2002, thirteen years post-surgery, Mrs. Gatz contacted the Little Sisters of the Poor in Kansas City to tell them that her husband had been cured of cancer through the intercession of Jeanne Jugan. The investigation into his cure was begun. In 2008, Pope Benedict XVI signed the decree endorsing the validity of the miraculous cure of Dr. Gatz through the intercession of Blessed Jeanne Jugan. In October 2009, Jeanne Jugan was canonized.

Dr. Gatz is often referred to as the miracle doctor, but he fervently clarifies, "I am not a miracle, I am the recipient of a miracle." He

goes on to further explain, "The miracle was not a snap of the fingers. It happened over time. To this day, functions continue to come back." When I asked Mrs. Gatz how long she prayed to St. Jeanne Jugan, she looked at me somewhat surprised and said, "Oh my, I've never stopped! The main thing is to have faith, and that is what has gotten us through."

The Gatz story is one that inspires faith, motivates hope and, much like the work of the Little Sisters, uplifts the spirit. It was a privilege to have had them in our midst.

Our Carriage House Rummage Sale, held annually each Spring and Fall, continues to be one of our best community building events, bringing together the combined efforts of not only our dedicated Rummage Sale Committee, but also volunteers at large, as well as Residents and staff. The work is year round with the inspection, sorting and categorizing of donations, culminating in a full week of set-up and pricing. The work is laborious and not at all glamorous, but the camaraderie among the volunteers devoted to this event is heartwarming. The income from the Spring Rummage Sale set a new record at \$26,000 for a two-day sale. Hat's off to all for our wonderful community event.

Extraordinary Providence

Susan Schneider, a local Bay Area artist, created *Light by Light*, a powerful and captivating diptych painting that debuted at the 2010 Red Tie Launch Party and was later displayed at the Red Tie Gala. The 60" x 96" work of art symbolizes the roots of the Little Sisters of the Poor as well as their compassionate mission. It represents shelter and recalls the early years of the congregation in 19th century France through stylized French rooftops. The glowing lights emanating from the windows represent the love shining brightly in the hearts of the elderly poor who have received shelter and care. All is set to the background of a grand sunset, which symbolizes the help from the Little Sisters of the Poor to those in the sunset of their years.

Susan felt strongly that the paintings belonged at St. Anne's, but wanted to sell them in order to share the proceeds with the Little Sisters. That opportunity presented itself this year when an ad for our recent Celebrate HeART event caught the eye of Susan's mother. It was not long before

Susan arrived at St. Anne's with hammer and hardware, ready to hang the paintings herself. The paintings were prominently hung in the St. Anne's lobby ready for our first-ever art sale gala. "It brought such joy to my heart to see how positively those who were seeing the paintings for the first time responded to the imagery and symbolism. I even told my mom, it was alright if they never sold, because the paintings were home at St. Anne's - where they belonged," shares Susan.

At the Celebrate HeART event, the history behind the work of *Light by Light* inspired a miraculous outcome. Our gracious Honorary Event Chair, Diane Wilsey, purchased the work and immediately donated it back to the Home. "The paintings will never have to leave St. Anne's! I could never have imagined such a beautiful and perfect outcome. It is my hope that the paintings now living in the lobby of St. Anne's Home bring light into every heart that sees them for years to come," says Susan joyfully.



Every book in the library was donated, and the ladies of the Auxiliary Library Committee (library ladies), who maintain and service the library, rely completely on donations for their inventory. A recent request put out by them for large-print books, resulted in the arrival of seventeen boxes of such books – all quite current, in very good condition, and across a wide range of subject matter. Those books were donated by St. Ignatius College Preparatory, from the estate of a recently deceased Jesuit priest. This donation was gratefully received, and the library

However, these publications are for perusal only in the library. Sonia Mares, chair of the Auxiliary's Library Committee is considering providing a reading service for those Residents with impaired vision.

In addition to maintaining inventory, re-stocking, and organizing the book shelves, the library ladies creatively decorate the library in seasonal themes. Their loving and
